# Ministry through Myanmar Institute of Theology (MIT)

The Fall enrollment at MIT is strong (1,250) and even with retirement and study leaves the faculty is energized with the schedule and classes. Dr. Samuel Ngun Ling, the Principal, indicated that the new five-storied classroom building is finished. Funds are needed to continue construction of a two-storied staff quarters and the construction of the library extension. The staff quarters building will provide room for six staff families. Our FOB associate from Burma also reported how these eye glasses have been marvelous blessings for Kyar Inn Seikkyi Village, Karen State, Bible School. He said, "We got 38 eyeglasses for this school through FOB donations. The village was in black area once. (this means fought over by the Karens and the government). There is bad communication due to hard terrain and sometimes flooded area. For eyeglasses they have to go to Mudon, Mawlamyaing. It is 5 hours' drive and they have to pay more than it should be. Sometimes they did not get fit eyeglasses for their eyes. They were very happy because this was the first time for them. We sent an eyeglasses man to the village and tested their eyes. He then came back to Yangon, made the eyeglasses and resent them to the village. The villagers don't know all the donors by name but they thank them very much and are praying for them."

## Youth Hostel in Taunggyi

Youth Hostel in Taunggyi was visited by Show Ei Ei Tun, a board member of FOB. She gave amazing reports of what God is doing with young lives in and through this ministry.

## School and health care related education scholarships.

We received thank you note from Rev. Martin Nyunt, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church in Yangon, for the support money sent from FOB donor in order to be used in preparing high school students for their matriculation exam. Only a small percentage of the students passed their exam each year so it is very important for them to have a good preparation. The medical students are also thankful that they will be able to use the money to buy books necessary for their study.

#### **Care and Counseling Department**

The Care and Counseling Department director informed us that a large number of students passed their high school matriculation exam in 2011-2012 academic year. This is a great achievement for the students. Other students are also studying very hard. On behalf of Care and Counseling Department she indicated that in 2012 and 2013 they plan to conduct further training for orphanage centers staffs. This was a request from the child care centers during their visit and interviewed them in order to collect staff quality assessment.

## Orphanage in Kyaukkyi

Kyaukkyi is a very unsettled area in Burma. It means hundreds and maybe thousands of villagers burned out of their houses and resettled in internal camps, or in the jungle. That is why there are orphans and currently there are 13 orphans at the facility. The name of this care center is Hpu Thu Thu Hpu Shay That. We thank and urge our generous donors to support the children from this facility.

#### **Flooding in Southwestern part of Burma**

Gone Min, Ye Dar Gyi, and Kyar Kan villages in Kyaung Gone district, and many villages associated with Pathein-Myaungmya Karen Baptist Association have faced difficulties due to flooding. The paddy fields were under water and many schools have been closed due to very high level of water. With no clean water to drink the villagers in these areas are in need of help.
